

**204** people with a mental health issue, addiction, or violence-related trauma received subsidized counselling services Counselling Services Program - Family Service Kent







1,000,000+ healthy meals and snacks were provided to students before and/or during the school day to ensure they were well nourished and ready to learn. Student Nutrition Program


